
Clothing Inside: Addressing American Prisons

about the exhibit

Clothing Inside: Addressing American Prisons will be available to view September 1st, 2022 - October 1st, 2022 at the Arnold and Sheila Aronson Gallery within Parsons, the New School. The exhibit centralizes the human experience behind bars by expressing the material conditions of incarceration. It serves as a critique to the ways that fashion functions as an oppressive force within carceral landscapes, while also highlighting fashion's unique and ongoing impressive engagement with work that opposes carceral regimes. This show is the culmination of research by Parsons MA Fashion Studies graduates Tzuni Lopez and Rashida Ricketts as well as Bard Prison Initiative graduate, Jonathan Alvarez.

our mission

In a concerted effort to showcase a hidden dimension of American life, we've staged a show that makes accessible a range of clothing objects used within carceral structures: items mandated by the state with which one adorns the body, clothing items that offer opportunity for self-expression, and finally, items used by those who use dress to protest conditions of confinement.

the vision

The exhibition is designed to force the viewer to reconsider their body in relation to these objects, to catapult a newfound engagement with one's sense of self while moving through a space of limitation and hyper-surveillance. We believe that clothing is a connective tissue – a means by which one can empathetically understand another's lived experience – and we hope that this exhibition will challenge a viewer's preconceptions about incarceration. Our hope is that viewers not only put themselves in the shoes of those living on the inside, but that the stories within Clothing Inside: Addressing American Prisons influences the viewer to become part of envisioning a new world - beyond prisons.

JONATHAN ALVAREZ

A dedicated change agent, Alvarez is a Youth Development and Juvenile Justice Reform Advocate in Westchester County, NY. After serving a 13year prison term, he returned home in 2018 motivated to help the same community he once negatively impacted. Driven to deter criminally-involved adolescents from a destructive path, in 2020 he co-founded a program-based mentorship non-for-profit organization called 914United Inc. He was also appointed to the Youth Offender Program at the Westchester County Department of Corrections. Alvarez has been invited as a panelist in Portland, Oregon on behalf of his work and continues to be a voice for criminal justice reform speaking from lived experiences and as a practitioner in the field.

Tzuni Lopez is a fashion researcher, lecturer, and independent curator currently living in Brooklyn, New York. Her work centers on the methods whereby fashion engages with everyday performance, and the manner in which that engagement affects conceptions of "normative" bodies and identities. She is one of the curators behind Clothing Inside: Addressing American Prisons and one of the editors of the newsletter Clothing Inside. Tzuni received her BA in Rhetorical Studies from Chapman University in 2016, and received her MA in Fashion Studies from Parsons, the New School, in 2021. When she's not curating, she can be found teaching classes in the history and theory of fashion and visual cultures at Parsons, the New School.
