but it wasn't always. From the 16th century to the 18th century, European nations were transitioning from the old Julian calendar to the new Gregorian calendar. Although the Dutch and most other European nations had adopted the new calendar in 1582, the English heid onto the old ways much longer. They continued to celebrate Annun-ciation Day, or Lady Day, March 25 as the New Year until 1752. In the colony of New Netherland, founded in the 1620s. the New Year was Jan. 1. But when the British took over in 1664, it changed to March 25.
