



New York State FY2022 Budget Breakdown

The most up to date information NPW has on the \$212 billion 2022 NY State Budget

Excluded Workers Fund

- \$2.1 billion will provide one-time unemployment benefits to undocumented immigrants who were excluded from federal and other relief efforts
- **Tier 1:** Excluded Workers can receive \$15,600. These workers must show a valid Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN), or a letter from an employer, valid pay stubs, W-2, and more
- **Tier 2:** Excluded Workers can receive \$3,200 if they can certify their identity, residency and show alternative proof of work-related eligibility

Child Care

- \$2.4 billion in child care resources to expand availability, quality and affordability of child care across the state
- Enhances the Employer Provided Child Care Credit to provide incentives to employers to help provide child care to employees

Public education

- A record \$29.5 billion in school aid
- Three-year tuition freeze for SUNY and CUNY students as well as a \$500 boost per person in the Tuition Assistance Program
- Full funding for statewide, full-day prekindergarten

Rent and Homeowner Relief and Protections

- \$2.4 billion Emergency Rental Assistance Program
- Payments for 12 months of back rent and utilities and three prospective months of rent
- One year of eviction protection
- \$600 million for homeowner assistance for those struggling with mortgage payments
- \$100 million for NY State to convert distressed commercial properties and hotels into affordable housing

Health Care

- Restores the \$415 million in originally proposed Medicaid cuts
- Delays for at least two years Medicaid costs by limiting reimbursements for prescription drugs bought by health care providers

Low-cost broadband

- Internet service providers have a cap on the amount they charge low-income people for broadband internet service
- They can charge no more than \$15 a month for high-speed internet

- Some people who will qualify include those eligible for Medicaid benefits and households eligible for free or reduced lunch

Nursing Homes

- A new requirement that adult care facilities spend at least 70% of their revenue on direct patient care, with 40% of that spent on staff who interact with residents
- 5% profit cap on nursing homes

Taxes

- Increases personal income taxes for people who make more than \$1 million per year and joint filers making more than \$2 million
- Keeps in place \$400 million in scheduled tax cuts for the middle class
- Increases the corporate franchise tax rate for the next three years

Property Tax Relief

- Applies to taxpayers who make less than \$250,000 based on the proportion of their income spent on property taxes.
- Income tax credits will range between \$250 and \$350. The total program will cost about \$440 million.
- Homeowners can claim the credit when they file their taxes in 2022

Capital projects

- \$1.3 billion in financing to overhaul the Penn Station
- \$285 million in repairs to roads, bridges and other infrastructure across the state
- \$150 million for the PAVE-NY program

Anti-Asian violence

- \$19.5 million legislative package to combat violence against Asian-Americans

Environment

- \$3 billion bond act to fund environmental restoration projects

Gambling

- Legalization of mobile sports betting
- Applicants who team up with Native American tribes will receive preferential consideration
- Revenues are projected to be in the hundreds of millions of dollars each year, with youth sports getting an annual cut of \$5 million, and \$6 million going to combat gambling addiction from Senate Democrats

Small Businesses

- \$1 billion for investing in small businesses recovery, with \$800 million in grants and \$200 million in tax credits

Other Budget Items:

- \$40 million for non-profit arts institutions
- \$25 million for the Nourish NY program
